## From the Range Light

### Summer Planning Sessions

This summer we need your help to dream, design and transform our "vision" into a reality!

On Tuesday, July 24 or Saturday, September 29 (duplicate sessions - you need only attend one), we invite you to join us as the Planning Committee takes us through a **three-step process** to develop The Ridges' **Long Range Plan**:

- First, we'll share the story of how the vision was created
- Secondly, we'll all share our values to guide future planning
- Last, we'll brainstorm (together) strategies for developing Ridges programs.

**First**, the Planning Committee will present what we've learned from past research projects, conferences, environmental education research and input from individuals and collaborating organizations – these have all helped guide the existing vision. Input has been gathered from:

#### 2006 Door County Natural Heritage Conference

In spring 2006 policy makers, educators, scientists and citizens met to learn about Door County's unique natural features and biodiversity. Participants identified the need to coordinate stewardship and conservation strategies, county-wide. They also talked about the importance of fostering connections to this wondrous landscape through environmental education in public schools, and of protecting ecologically significant habitats and unique natural features by addressing gaps in current resources.

#### 2004 Ridges Members Survey

41% of members responded with ideas for future Ridges planning: Defining our role in land acquisition; prioritizing programs; considering more adult programs; building a new building; developing a clear and compelling communication plan; acquiring more and younger members; and increasing our financial support.

#### 2003 and 2004 Board and Staff Retreats

We updated our mission statement "To protect the Sanctuary and inspire stewardship of natural areas through programs of education, outreach, and research". We also began creating our vision by identifying threats, weaknesses, and opportunities to the organization.

#### 2003 "Guide to Significant Wildlife and Natural Areas of Door County, Wisconsin"

A county-wide group identified conservation goals, threats and information needs/gaps for 17 ecological significant complexes – one being The Ridges

Sanctuary (in a management corridor with Mud Lake State Natural Area, Toft Point State Natural Area and North Bay State Natural Area).

- **Second**, we'll have time to share together what we all truly value in The Ridges. From these, we'll compile Ridges "value statements" to guide future planning.

- **And last**, we'll need your creative ideas to brainstorm ways to fulfill our vision.

The Planning Committee has created six goals (below) on which to comment, and we'll talk about each:

### Program Goals

**Protection of the Sanctuary:** Recognizing the obligation of stewardship of its natural areas, as envisioned by the founders, the **primary goal of The Ridges Sanctuary, Inc. is to protect its lands, flora, and fauna** from harmful impacts of human activity, invasive species, and other potential threats.

**Education:** Based on its unique ecology and geography, a goal of the Ridges is to identify and educate various audiences in the ethical, aesthetic, and ecological values of our natural heritage, in the importance of stewardship, and in opportunities for personal participation.

**Outreach:** A goal of the Ridges organization is to communicate its vision, and to encourage appreciation of the ecological and aesthetic values of the Sanctuary.

**Research:** To encourage, promote and facilitate research on the biota and physical and chemical environment of the Sanctuary.

### Administrative Goals

**Administration, Facilities, and Finance:** The strategic plan must identify and provide for necessary personnel, buildings, equipment, and finance.

**Development:** To assure the projected financial requirements to implement the plan, the final goal is to create and execute a comprehensive funding and development program.

Our Sanctuary is Wisconsin's most biologically diverse area. Here's some time to dream about what's possible and to create a plan for its permanent protection! # Summer Kids Programs



It's time to register your child (or grandchild) for a **Ridges Summer Youth Program!** Each program, geared to your child's age, offers hands-on adventures into the woods and waters of the Sanctuary. Activities include hikes, stories, crafts and nature games. Two or more adults staff each session.

## **KIT CAMP** (age 4 - Grade K)

Theme: **Birds, Beasts and Bugs**

Each day includes activities, nature art, storytime, and a hike. A cookout lunch and "graduation" ceremony held last day of camp.

*Registration fee: \$45 members / \$55 nonmembers (includes staffing, crafts, snacks and cookout). No pro-rated fee for partial attendance.*

## **FOXES** (Entering Grades 1-2)

**Mondays in July, 9 am - 12 noon**

Theme: **Living Things of all Shapes and Sizes**

Foxes take a close-up look at the living things of all shapes and sizes that make their homes in the Sanctuary. Each day's activities include a hike, games, stories and snacks.

**July 2 - Hunters of the Night** – Learn about the amazing world of bats and owls.

**July 9 - Sensory Safari** – Explore The Ridges using all 5 of your senses (yes, even taste!).

**July 16 - Mammal Mania** – Investigate what makes mammals different from other creatures, and take a hike to find some.

**July 23 - Terrific Trees** – Examine the unique trees at the Ridges, and learn how animals depend on them.

# Meet D.E.E.P.

In a phone conversation last fall, my friend Nicole and I were reminiscing about all the wonderful adventures we'd had last summer – living, working and playing in Door County. We both grinned reliving nights spent in hammocks, sailboat rides into the sunset, potlucks with friends playing bluegrass around the campfire, and of course sensational plunges into Lake Michigan after a sweaty day's work. Our talk soon turned to this summer and the "college student's dilemma": Return to friends and community we so cherished? or find respectable jobs for future employers? Fortunately we were able to find a creative and exciting solution: We would start an environmental group in the Door community to both bring us back home and challenge us to share our experiences in environmentalism! We conceived DEEP: **Door Environmental Education Program.**

Though Nicole was starting her junior year in Environmental Studies at Brown and I was a junior in Rural Sociology and Environmental Studies at UW-Madison, we managed to find The Ridges, and they were receptive to our idea and willing to provide a platform for DEEP. More than anything, Nicole and I want to use DEEP to provide what we wished we'd gotten more formally before college: A place to facilitate learning and discussion of environmental issues for high school and college-age community members.

As we reminisced on our summer fun, though, we also realized we had something else to offer Door residents. In our time in the county we'd developed an astoundingly strong "sense of place" here, and wanted to also use the DEEP classes to engage participants in a similar experience. On the surface it may appear that we're developing an understanding of wetlands and carbon molecules, cows and parks, but we predict the ultimate result will be a much deeper

development: a Door community sense of place, including all its natural and social elements. Each experience will be a lens, each meeting a different approach to the same goal – to answer the question "Where do I live?" as viscerally as possible. For, in the words of J.B. Jackson – "It is place, permanent position in both the social and topographical sense, that gives us our identity".

In weekly adventures Nicole and I will invite you to explore with us this summer. We'll offer dialogue, pertinent films, workshops and field experiences to give participants a layered understanding of environmental focus issues in the county. We'll run a broad spectrum of issues – from geography to mechanisms of local government, from exploring sustainability and preservation to local perspectives on agriculture and dairy industries. While this is a melting pot of environmental concerns, our focus will always highlight issues on the Door peninsula.

## There's Still Time!

In 2006 a new tax law provided for **tax-free charitable contributions from your IRA** of up to \$100,000 per year. This provision extends to the end of 2007 only!

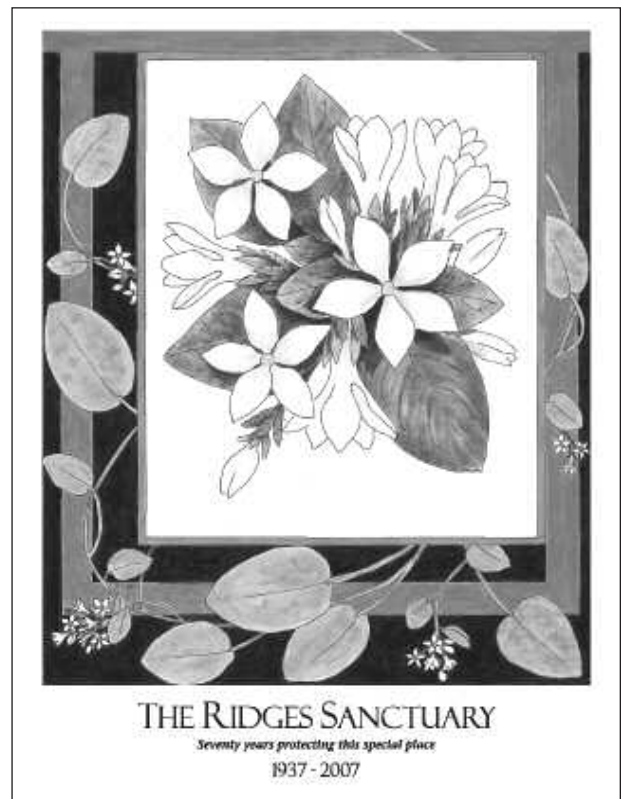
If you're at least 70½ years old, and considering a charitable gift to The Ridges you can still do so by contacting your IRA custodian or financial advisor now. Gifts must be made by December 30, 2007 – so please allow time for processing.

Besides allowing you to make a charitable gift to The Ridges, this incentive has other benefits:

- Your gift is not taxed as an IRA distribution, thus potentially reduces your income tax (and exposure to the Alternative Minimum Tax)
- If you're required to take an annual minimum withdrawal but don't need that income, you can transfer the money directly to charity
- A substantial contribution can also serve as a significant income reduction tool
